GENERAL REGISTRATION

Registration Dates:

For Winter Term 2008–November 12-16, 2007

For Spring Term 2008–February 25–February 29, 2008

For Fall Term 2008–May 19-23, 2008

To be eligible to register:

NOTE: All full-time incoming students born after January 1, 1957 are required to show proof of 2 measles (Rubeola) immunizations. This proof must be presented at the Student Health Center prior to the second term of enrollment.

1. Registration Process

Registration times for all academic terms except Summer Session, are determined by total credit hours earned with graduate students receiving first priority, followed by seniors, juniors, sophomores and freshmen. Non-admitted students are assigned times beginning the week following registration week. Students are notified of their registration time through their WOU email address two weeks prior to registration. Students who qualify for services through the Office of Disability Services should contact that office for consideration of earlier registration.

A. Currently enrolled students

1. Undergraduate students are required to meet with their major advisor prior to registration each term to remove their advising hold.
2. Review the schedule of classes and registration instruction sheet. These materials are available at the Registrar's Office, various locations around campus, and are posted on the internet at www.wou.edu/scheduleofclasses.
3. Plan a schedule for the upcoming term. Include alternate sections and courses.
4. Refer to the registration instructions to determine your registration start time. You may log on to the web registration system via the Registrar's Office home page at any time after your assigned start time.

B. New and returning students

1. New students should apply for admission at least two terms in advance of the term for which they wish to enroll. Upon admission the Admissions Office will send students information regarding registration. It is imperative that newly admitted students follow these instructions carefully.
2. Previously admitted students who are not currently enrolled should submit an application for re-enrollment form as early as possible and no later than two terms prior to the term for which re-enrollment is desired. Upon approval of the application the Registrar's Office will provide students with information regarding registration. The student should plan to follow the steps listed above for currently enrolled students.

Registration Information

When student's requested class schedule has been confirmed, the registration process is complete and a valid accounts receivable will be accrued by this institution. A student must pay the full amount of tuition and fees accrued as a result of his/her confirmed schedule unless a written withdrawal or cancellation is received in the Registrar's Office by the first day of classes for that term. After that time, the student's financial obligation will be determined by the Business Office in accordance with the State Board of Higher Education's Refund Schedule listed on page 7.

Steps in Registration

- A. All students who registered before first day of the term:
 - If you are making no changes in your schedule, proceed to the Fee Payment location listed in the fee payment schedules. Please retain your receipt.
 - If you desire to make changes to your schedule, obtain an Add/Drop form, make the necessary changes, obtain instructor's signatures and sign the form before completing registration and paying fees;
 - Bring completed forms to the Registrar's Office for processing; and
 - Pay fees at ITC 013 or cashier's office per fee payment schedules on page 5.
- B. All students who did not register before the first day of the term but were authorized to enroll:
 - Obtain an Add/Drop form before your first class meeting, complete the form, and have the instructor sign the Add/ Drop.
 - Bring your signed and completed forms to the Registrar's Office, and complete any other registration forms needed.
 - Pay fees at location listed in fee payment schedules.

OTHER REGISTRATION INFO

Alternate Courses

A student may improve the possibility of getting a full schedule through the judicious use of alternate courses. Discussing alternate course selections with an advisor before registration is strongly encouraged.

Full-time and Maximum Registration

Full-time undergraduate students are those enrolled in 12 credit hours (9 for graduates), with 15-16 (12-15 for graduates) hours being the average. The maximum number of hours for which a student may register without special permission from the Registrar's Office is 18 for undergraduates (12 for summer session) and 16 for graduates (9 for summer session), including courses offered through the Division of Extended Programs and courses offered through other Oregon University System colleges. Exceptions to the maximum load for graduate students are allowed by petition with the recommendation of your advisor and approval of the Graduate Office. Undergraduate students need to obtain their advisor recommendation and the approval of the registrar.

Adding and Dropping Courses

- Add/Drop forms are available at the Registrar's Office, Administration Building.
- Student and instructor signatures are required for each add/drop.
- The add or drop is not official until submitted to the Registrar's Office. Fee refunds, if appropriate, are computed based on the day the add/drop is received by the Registrar's Office.
- Be attentive to deadlines for adds/drops (see page 7)

Late Registration

Students who fail to meet registration or payment deadlines of any type may forfeit the opportunity to carry out the desired registration action, (i.e. late, add, fee payment). Students who determine that a problem exists and seek the assistance of the appropriate office before the applicable deadline may be granted

TUITION AND FEE PAYMENT INFO

A bill with student charges will be mailed to the student shortly before the beginning of the term for which registration has been accomplished. See fee payment schedule. If additional hours are added or changes are made to the student's schedule after the initial bill has been sent, please check with the Business Office for a current bill total. or you can look up your total on-line using your pin number on the Web. Look under "account summary by term" to view your total. Failure to receive a bill is not an acceptable excuse for late payment! On line financial aid application to your account will be available a few days before the term begins, so check for this date on the Web right before the term starts.

Fee Payment

Entry schedule: Students will be admitted to the fee payment area sequenced alphabetically by last name according to the schedule noted below. Be prepared to show acceptable identification (student ID, drivers license, etc.) prior to entry. For fee payment, students must enter during their allotted times.

Students who miss their allotted times may pay fees during the following times: Tuesday, April 1, through Friday, April 4, 2008, 8:30am-5:00pm, ITC Addition.

Evening student fee payment is during the following times: Monday, March 31, through Thursday, April 3, 2008, 5:00pm-6:00pm ITC Addition.

Students with conflicts between an allotted fee payment time and a scheduled class time may pay fees after their time on their designated day. Please present class schedule to confirm conflict. Students are expected to have all current term charges paid by the designated due dates listed in the Academic Calendar on page 2 unless they are using the revolving charge program for the term defined on page 7. This includes all tuition, fees, housing charges, insurance, etc., that may have been added after the term begins. Failure to receive a billing is not an acceptable excuse for late payment.

Academic year tuition includes the following mandatory fees: tuition, building, incidental, technology and health service. Tuition is established to provide support for the cost of instructional expenditures. Building fees are used to repay building fee debt service. The incidental fee supports student union activities, athletic activities and educational, cultural and student government activities. The technology fee is a resource fee in support of the maintenance and enhancement of technology. The health service fee gives students access to the Student Health and Counseling Centers.

*Note: The health service fee is comprised of two parts: 1) the fee supporting the counseling center, medical facility and professional staff; 2) the fee for basic medical insurance coverage. The University requires health insurance coverage as a condition of enrollment for any student taking 9 credit hours or more each term. Part one of the health service fee is optional for students taking 8 credit hours or less. These students may choose to pay this fee any time during the term and then use the Student Health and Counseling Centers. Students taking 8 credit hours or less are not eligible for the basic insurance plan, part two of the health service fee. Students who have 9 hours or more at any time during the term are responsible for these fees.

Tuition and Regular Fees

A schedule of current tuition and fees for the 2007-2008 academic year will be available after September 1, 2007.

• Notice is hereby given that by definition of the State Board of Higher Education any person who holds a degree from an accredited college or university is considered to be a graduate student for fee purposes,

with the exception of formally admitted graduate students who have been admitted as a Post Baccalaureate Nongraduate declaration. These students are limited to enrollment in undergraduate courses.

Special Fees

Students planning to enroll under a Graduate Assistantship should contact the appropriate division office for detailed information about the program.
- Staff Fee Per credit hour varies
- Technology Fee Per credit hour varies
Anyone using staff rates for the purpose of paying tuition and fees are required to pay technology fees. Staff rates do not entitle the person to privileges of the incidental, or health services fees. Staff and faculty are subject to the same late fees, revolving charge, and interest policies as all other students. Dependents of staff and faculty are eligible upon approval from Human Resources to use staff rates, and, in addition, are required to pay all incidental and health fees and thus receive associated fee benefits.

Students as Full-time with Less Than 12 Credits

It is WOU's policy to recognize there are times when some students will be in a situation that necessitates a full-time course load at less than 12 credits.

A student shall be considered full-time when registered for less than 12 credits when said student is identified by an authority on campus as needing this service. Authority shall include but not be limited to the President, the Provost, and the Director of Disability Services.

The Registrar will have on file a record of all students each term who fall within this status.

Students who have been identified, with reason, as being full-time while taking less than 12 credits shall enjoy all the benefits of a regular full-time student. Federal statute requires that for federal financial aid purposes a full-time course

load is considered to be 12 credits for undergraduates/post baccalaureates non graduates and 9 credits for a graduate student working towards a Master's program.

With Reason shall include but not be limited to an accommodation for a student with a disability. Benefits shall include but not be limited to eligibility for Western Scholarships based on GPA status, Dean's list, access to services based on full-time status.

Photo I.D. Cards

One I.D. card will be issued to each student attending Western free of charge. These cards are to be used for your entire tenure at Western at both the undergraduate and graduate level. Submit your I.D. card to the cashier each term upon payment of fees for validation.

Anyone needing a replacement card will be assessed a \$10.00 fee. If you lose your I.D. card, you may get a replacement at the WUC Information desk M-F, 8 a.m.-4:30p.m. Please note: This card serves as a meal card for dorm students. If you are living on campus, you will need to obtain a temporary meal card from the housing office while your replacement card is being processed. An additional fee will be assessed for this.

Anyone using the WOU library will need a valid I.D. card.

Revolving Charge Program

When a student's requested class schedule has been confirmed, the registration process is complete and a valid accounts receivable may be accrued by this institution.

Western requires all students to complete a Revolving Charge Account Plan Contract to be kept on file in the Business Office. For any term you do not pay in full during fee payment week (see page 5 for fee payment dates), you will be assessed a \$12.00 service charge. The option to pay in full at the beginning of the term always exists. Subsequent payments are always due on the first of the following month. Interest is charged on any unpaid balance at the rate of one percent per month, or fraction thereof (12% APR). To be considered a fully enrolled student at least one-third of all the current term charges plus any past due balance must be paid at the beginning of the term. Also two-thirds of your current term charges will have to be paid before a student will be able to register for subsequent terms. A more detailed statement of policy is available at the Business Office.

Short Term Deferment

WOU students may be eligible for a short term institutional deferment. This plan may be used when a student is unable to come up with the first third of the current term charges that are due at the beginning of the current term. A service charge of \$12.00 per term is charged if the student is in need of this service. Deferments not repaid when due will be assessed interest of one percent per month, or fraction thereof (12% APR). Short term deferments may be used in conjunction with the revolving charge plan. A more detailed statement of policy is available at the Business Office.

Emergency Loans

WOU students may be eligible for an emergency institutional loan. These loans are for student emergencies other than institutional charges. A separate promissory note is required for these loans. Depending on the amount of the loan needed the service charge is \$5.00 per hundred (or fraction thereof) borrowed. Loans not repaid when due will be assessed a \$5.00 late fee plus interest at one percent per month, or fraction thereof (12% APR). A more detailed statement of policy is available at the Business Office

Fee Refunds

The tuition refund schedule for complete withdrawal, cancellations and course load reduction is listed below for the 2006-2007 academic year. The tuition refund schedule is in effect even if you have not paid or attended classes. You must cancel in WRITING with the Registrar's office prior to the start of the term to NOT be responsible for tuition. Students must officially withdraw or cancel whether or not they attend classes.

All refunds are determined by the date of receipt of the written request in the Registrar's office, and are based on calendar days. The refund policy is on file in the Business office and is established by using the following schedule.

Before the first day of classes.....	100%	Refund
Before the close of the 11th calendar day after classes begin	85%	Refund
Before the close of the 18th calendar day after classes begin	50%	Refund
Before the close of the 25th calendar day after classes begin	25%	Refund

Any claim for refund, other than those indicated above, must be made in writing before the close of the term in which the claim originated. Exceptions to the refund schedule may be made by the Registrar in those cases where circumstances exist which are beyond the control of the student.

In no case will a refund exception be made beyond one year from the end of the term in which the claim originated. Refund policy examples are available in the Business Office.

Any refunds will be used to repay unpaid amounts due the Oregon University System before any money is forwarded to the student.

Note: Western Oregon University reserves the right to change refund dates and/or percentages without notice.

Collection Efforts

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education Fiscal Administration Standard Operating Manual requires Western Oregon University to be "...responsible for exercising diligence in collecting accounts and notes receivable." Actions that may be taken to meet that requirement include but are not limited to:

- Withholding of transcripts and grades;
- Cancellation or denial of registration;
- Cancellation of future accounts receivable privileges;
- Application of any refund toward debts with O.U.S. schools;
- Late penalties and interest;
- Offset procedures with other state agencies;
- Submission of the debt to the Department of Revenue or an outside collection agency for collection efforts;
- Reporting account delinquency to Credit Bureaus.

TESTING CENTER

The Division of Extended Programs offers these academic entrance exams throughout the year: Miller Analogies Test (MAT), Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL), and State Board of Tax Examiners (SBTE). For dates, sign-up deadlines, costs and

2007-2008 FINANCIAL AID

Academic Progress Requirements

Financial aid recipients are expected to maintain satisfactory academic progress and complete degree requirements or educational objectives in a timely manner according to institutional and Financial Aid Office policies. They must meet Western Oregon University's academic requirements outlined in the WOU catalog and comply with WOU's financial aid academic requirements as outlined below. The Financial Aid Office monitors financial aid recipients' academic progress at the end of every term and on an annual basis. The annual review is performed each June after the end of spring term. Summer term is monitored separately. Letter grades of F, W, NC, I, X and AU do not apply toward the satisfactory completion of the credit hour minimums. Students may not use credits by exam (credits earned by challenging an individual course) or College Level Equivalency Test (CLEP) credits to meet the minimum credit requirements. A class taken to improve a grade may be included in minimum credit requirements if the student has not exceeded the maximum credit hour limit. You may not receive financial aid to retake a class for which you received an incomplete unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Lack of satisfactory academic progress could consist of the following:

Insufficient credit hours earned

All financial aid recipients are required to register for and satisfactorily complete the following number of credit hours for each term of attendance. Summer term credit hour requirements are the same as for all other terms.

The Financial Aid Office will assume that students who complete zero credit hours (excluding students who receive all "I" or "X" grades) have unofficially withdrawn from the university. The students will be considered to have withdrawn at the 50% point of the term and they may be required to repay some or all of their financial aid. Professors may document attendance beyond the 50% point of the term with an email or memo on letterhead to the Financial Aid Office.

If a student completes less than half-time credits during the term, the student's aid will be placed on "HOLD" and he/she will be required to petition for the reinstatement of future financial aid.

If, at the end of the academic year, a student is cumulatively deficient credit hours, the student's future financial aid will be placed on "HOLD" and he/she will be required to petition for reinstatement of future financial aid.

A student receiving full-time aid fall, winter and spring terms will be given a grace of 3 credits deficiency at the end of the academic year if all other satisfactory progress requirements have been met while a student at WOU.

A repayment of financial aid may be required if a student receives X grades. A student who does not attend any classes or receives all X grades will be required to repay all aid disbursed during that term unless documentation proving class attendance is provided. A student who receives some X grade(s) in addition to other grades

may be required to prove class attendance if the X grade(s) cause(s) a deficiency in credit hours. If the student cannot prove attendance in the X grade class(es), repayment of a portion of the student's federal or state aid may be required. Documentation of attendance must be provided within a given time limit. Students receiving "X" grades may be required to petition for reinstatement of future financial aid.

Transfer students (beginning the first term at WOU) are considered to be in good satisfactory academic progress since they have met Western Oregon University's admission criteria. However, if a student has exceeded the maximum credit hours allowed for financial aid eligibility, the student may need to petition. Refer to "Excessive Credit Hours Attempted."

Excessive credit hours attempted

Financial aid will be placed on "HOLD" and the student will be required to petition for the reinstatement of financial aid if his/ her cumulative number of attempted credit hours (including any transfer credits) exceed the following:

- Undergraduate Degree 220 credit hours
- Post Baccalaureate /2nd UG Degree 48 credit hours
- Grad/Master's Degree varies by program

Academic suspension

If a student is academically suspended from WOU, the student's aid will be placed on "HOLD" and the student will be required to petition for reinstatement of financial aid. The student must first petition for readmittance to WOU. The petition for readmission must be approved prior to petitioning for reinstatement of financial aid. Petitions for readmission are available from the Registrar's Office.

Failure to meet previous petition requirements

Read petition results carefully. If a student is directed to meet certain criteria to continue receiving financial aid, the student must comply with those conditions. If the student does not comply with the conditions, his/her financial aid will be suspended and he/she will be required to petition for reinstatement of aid. Previous petition requirements will be monitored each term of the requirement.

Juniors or seniors with a cumulative GPA of less than 2.0

Financial aid will be placed on "HOLD" at the end of each term and the student will be required to petition for the reinstatement of financial aid if the student is a junior or senior and his/her cumulative GPA is less than 2.0.

Petitioning

Financial aid petition forms are available at the Financial Aid Office or on the Financial Aid Office website.

If a student does not meet the academic progress criteria, the student must petition explaining his/her special circumstances prior to receiving any additional financial aid. Special circumstances such as, but not limited to, an injury or illness to the student or death of a relative will be considered in petition determination.

Appeal Process

Students have the right to appeal their petition determination. Appeal forms are available from and must be submitted to the Financial Aid Office.

Withdrawing and Return of Federal Financial Aid

The amount of Title IV aid that a student must repay is determined via the Federal Formula for Return of Title IV Funds as specified in Section 484B of the Higher Education Act. The law also specifies the order of return of the Title IV funds to the programs from which they were awarded.

Students who withdraw from all classes prior to completing more than 60% of an enrollment term will have their eligibility for aid recalculated based on the percent of the term completed. For example, a student who withdraws completing only 30% of the term will have "earned" only 30% of any Title IV aid received (other than Federal Work-Study). The student and /or the school must return (repay) the remaining 70% of the federal funds received to the federal government.

I. This policy applies to all students who withdraw, drop out or are expelled from Western Oregon University and receive financial aid from Title IV funds:

A. The term "Title IV Funds" refers to the federal financial aid programs authorized under the Higher Education Act of 1965 (as amended) and includes the following programs: Federal Direct Stafford Loans (Subsidized and Unsubsidized), Federal Direct PLUS Loan, Federal Pell Grant, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), Federal Perkins Loan and other Title IV Programs.

B. A student's withdrawal date is:

1. The date the student initiates the institution's withdrawal process; or
2. The midpoint of the period for a student who leaves without notifying the institution; or
3. The student's last date of attendance at a documented academically related activity.

C. A student who has not attended classes during the term of withdrawal will be required to repay 100% of all financial aid funds disbursed to him or her. Students receiving "X" grades may be required to repay funds if they cannot establish that they attended class during the term. Documentation of attendance must be provided in a timely manner. Acceptable forms of documentation of class attendance include exams, records of attendance, computer assisted instruction, or a memo or email from the professor.

II. Title IV aid is earned in a prorated manner on a per diem basis up to and including the 60% point in the term. Title IV aid is viewed as 100% earned after the 60% point in time.

A. The percentage of Title IV aid earned shall be calculated as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of days completed by student}}{\text{Total number of days in term}} = \text{Percent of term completed}$$

The percent of term completed shall be the percentage of Title IV aid earned by the student.

B. The percentage of Title IV aid unearned shall be 100% minus the percent earned. This amount will be returned to the appropriate Title IV program.

Unearned Title IV aid shall be returned first by WOU from the student's account by calculating the term's institutional charges multiplied by the percent of unearned aid. Unearned Title IV aid shall be returned to the following programs in the following order:

1. Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loan
2. Federal Direct Subsidized Loan
3. Federal Perkins Loan
4. Federal Direct Graduate Plus Loan
5. Federal Direct Parent PLUS Loan

6. Federal Pell Grant
 7. Academic Competitiveness Grant
 8. National SMART Grant
 9. Federal SEOG
 10. Other Title IV Grant Funds
- No program can receive a refund if the student did not receive aid from that program.

C. When the total amount of unearned aid is greater than the amount returned by WOU, the student is responsible for returning unearned aid to the appropriate program(s) as follows:

1. Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loan*
2. Federal Direct Subsidized Loan*
3. Federal Perkins Loan*
4. Federal Direct Graduate Plus Loan*
5. Federal Direct Parent PLUS Loan*
6. Federal Pell Grant**
7. Academic Competitiveness Grant**
8. National SMART Grant**
9. Federal SEOG**
10. Other Title IV Grant Funds**

*Students are permitted to "return" loan funds according to loan repayment provisions in the promissory note. This usually means the student will have a grace period and also deferments if the student returns to school.

**Amounts to be returned by the student to federal grant programs will be reduced by 50% of the total grant aid disbursed (or available to be disbursed) and will be due immediately to the Business Office at WOU.

If the student is entitled to a refund from WOU amounts paid to cover institutional charges, any refund due to the student will first be applied to the student's obligation to return "unearned" aid before the student receives any money back. Thus, portions of institutional refunds maybe applied on the student's behalf to the student's outstanding Title IV Funds account and not actually refunded directly to the student. Refunds on all institutional charges, including tuition and fees and room and board, will be calculated using the school's refund policy published in the WOU Schedule of Classes.

III. Adjusted bills and award letters will be sent to the student's home address on file at WOU. Students are responsible for keeping their addresses current with WOU. Students are responsible for any portion of their institutional charges that are left outstanding after funds are returned to the Title IV account.

IV. Institutional and students' responsibilities in regard to the return of Title IV funds:

- A. WOU's responsibilities in regard to the return of Title IV funds include:
1. Providing each student with the information given in this policy.
 2. Identifying students who are affected by this policy and completing the Return of Title IV Funds calculation for those students.
 3. Notifying the student regarding the amount of money due from the student to repay unearned Title IV Funds.
 4. On behalf of the student, the school returns any Title IV funds to the Title IV programs that were used to pay the current term's institutional charges.
- B. The student's responsibilities in regard to the return of Title

IV funds include:

1. Becoming familiar with the Return of Title IV Funds policy and how complete withdrawal affects eligibility for Title IV aid. The student must repay or make arrangements to repay a grant overpayment from a withdrawal in order to regain Title IV eligibility. Contact the Business Office regarding repayments.
2. Following the withdrawal procedures.

Withdrawal Steps for Financial Aid Recipients

1. Student obtains an application to withdraw from the Registrar's Office.
2. Student completes and obtains signatures from a) the Vice President for Student Affairs Office, b) the Financial Aid Office, and c) the Business Office.
3. Student returns the withdrawal form to the Registrar's Office.
4. Return of Title IV aid determinations will be based on the date the student began the withdrawal process.
5. Financial aid recipients withdrawing before the 60% point of the term will be required to repay a percentage of aid received for the term.
6. Financial aid recipients who received a federal student loan during their attendance at WOU will be provided loan exit counseling materials.
7. Students who received aid during the term for which they are withdrawing and want to be considered for future financial aid at WOU must submit a petition to the Financial Aid Office. The petition must be approved prior to receiving aid for any future term at WOU. Appeals to aid denials may be made by completing an appeal form available from the Financial Aid Office.
8. Alternative Notification of Withdrawal from WOU: contact the Registrar's Office for alternative methods of withdrawal.

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS AND PROCEDURES

The college catalog is an important source for additional information. Students are responsible for familiarizing themselves with the information within it.

Every student is responsible for knowing the regulations governing his/her relations to Western Oregon University. Deviation from these regulations and procedures will be permitted only through petition to the appropriate committee.

Teacher Education, Intern, and Student Teaching

All students interested in entering Teacher Education must have cleared their admission to the program before they are authorized to enroll in professional courses. Application for Teacher Education is made during the third term of the sophomore year. Forms are available through the Field Service Office, Ed 201.

In addition, students must make separate application for Student Teaching or Interning. Special attention is called to the deadline dates on page 2 of the schedule.

Post Baccalaureate Non Graduate: Holds a baccalaureate degree, working toward undergraduate degree or initial licensure.

Declares at the time of admission undergraduate status.

This status allows assessment of undergraduate tuition and accumulation of undergraduate credits.

Graduate Student: Has earned baccalaureate degree, and is working toward teaching licensure or master's degree.

Non-Admitted Undergraduate*: Not working toward degree or licensure and not regularly admitted, limited to eight credits maximum enrollment per term.

Non-Admitted Graduate*: Holds baccalaureate degree, not working toward degree or licensure. Limited to eight credits maximum enrollment per term.

* Financial Aid, Veterans Benefits and other academic services are not available to Non-Admitted Students.

Class Enrollment

a. Ordinarily a student may enroll in a course numbered one year beyond his/her class standing without special permission, provided he/she has met any prerequisite; for example, a sophomore may enroll in a 300 course under such conditions. Some courses have a level restriction which prevents students with a lower class standing from enrolling in the course/section. Enrollment in a course numbered two years beyond a student's class standing is permissible by consent of the instructor.

b. Undergraduates cannot enroll for courses at the 600 level. Students who are within 12 credits of completing bachelor's degree requirements may petition for permission to enroll for up to a maximum of 12 graduate credits in courses numbered 500 for later use in a graduate program. Petitions are available in the Registrar's Office.

Physical Education Waivers

Military Waivers. Students who have served a minimum of three months consecutively on active military duty, not including reserve drills and summer camps, may petition for the waiver of up to two hours of credit in physical education activity courses. To qualify, a student must file evidence of service. The Registrar's Office has additional information. The following exceptions apply:

1. No credit will be allowed solely for basic training in the military service.
2. No waiver will be granted to any student majoring or minoring in physical education.

Medical Waiver or Modification. Modification of physical education requirements may be made on recommendation of a physician. Requests for modification or waiver must be accompanied by a statement from the physician stating the medical reasons why physical activity should be limited and should be submitted to the Division Chair of Health/Physical Education.

Scholarship Regulations

The scholarship regulations are based on the following principles.

A student is doing satisfactory work when a GPA of 2.0 or better is maintained and substantial progress is made toward completion of graduation requirements.

Warning. A student failing to do satisfactory work in any term of the academic year receives an academic warning. If the GPA the following term (excluding summer term) and the cumulative GPA (for all college work) are 2.0 or better, the student is removed from warning. A student who receives an academic warning is required to meet with the director of the Academic Advising & Learning Center to discuss strategies for success.

Probation. A student on academic warning failing to do satisfactory work in any term of the academic year is placed on

academic probation. If the GPA the following term (excluding summer term) and the cumulative GPA (for all college work) are 2.0 or better, the student is removed from probation. Students placed on academic probation are required to meet with the director of the Academic Advising & Learning Center to develop a plan for academic success.

Suspension. A probationary student whose GPA for any term of the academic year is below 2.0 will be suspended and will not be permitted to register again without the consent of the registrar. The procedure for applying for readmission begins in the Registrar's Office. To be readmitted, suspended students are required to enroll in and successfully complete the university's learning seminar.

Dropping a Course

A student may drop a course (or courses) without being responsible for a grade through the date indicated in the academic calendar. A student who quits attending a course without processing a drop form will normally be given an F grade.

Procedure

The form for dropping a course is obtained in the Registrar's Office. It must be completed and signed by the student, submitted to the Registrar's Office and the fee paid before the action can be considered official.

Repeating a Course

A student may repeat a course. Only the most recent grade will be computed in the GPA. Earlier course attempts will remain on the transcript but will be annotated as repeated coursework. Only the latest attempt will be counted toward graduation requirements.

Withdrawal from School

A student may withdraw from WOU without being responsible for grades up to the scheduled date shown on the academic calendar. A student who quits attending classes without processing a withdrawal from school will be issued an F grade in all courses. The student is then subject to appropriate academic action at the close of the term. It should be noted, however, that in situations of emergency (accidents, prolonged illness, etc.) a student may be permitted to withdraw from WOU without any grade penalty at any time with a written medical recommendation from the attending physician. Contact the Registrar's Office for further information.

Procedure: The student must fill out the necessary withdrawal form available from the Registrar's Office, complete the process as required in the various offices listed on the form, obtain a signature from the Vice President for Student Affairs and return the form to the Registrar's Office. All obligations to the school must be met in order to receive honorable dismissal. Under no circumstances will the withdrawal be official until this procedure has been completed.

Note: Failure to complete the required procedure for dropping a course or withdrawing from school will normally result in grades of F on the student's permanent record.

Grades

The grading system consists of twelve passing grades: A, A-, B+, B, B-, C+, C, C-, D+, D, D-, P (pass). Additionally, F (failure), W (withdrawal from course), NC (no credit), I (incomplete), and X (no basis for grades) are used.

An incomplete (I) grade may be assigned when the quality of work is satisfactory but an essential requirement of the course has not been completed for reasons acceptable to the instructor. To change an incomplete to a letter grade, the student must complete the work within 12 months following the award of the "I". Special extension may be granted by petition, if approved by the instructor and the Registrar's Office, but for a period no longer than an additional 12 months. Beyond the maximum 24-month period the incomplete becomes permanent. At the discretion of the instructor the "I" may be retained or it may be changed to a grade.

Pass-No Credit Grading Option

An undergraduate student is allowed to take elective courses on a pass-no credit basis. Electives are understood to be any course other than those used to fulfill the LACC, major, minor, or degree requirements.

The responsibility for describing the level of competency necessary for passing the course lies with the instructor. When taken in conjunction with a course also offered for letter grades (A-F), the passing level is normally equivalent to a grade of D or better. Students who achieve the required level of competency will receive a grade of P (pass) on their official record. Students who fail to achieve this level will receive a grade of NC (no credit) on their official record. Neither grade will be figured into the student's grade point average.

During the registration period of the term (the time allowed for adding courses), students may elect to change a course to a pass-no credit basis with the Registrar's Office. After this deadline, the student must continue and complete the course under the grading system initially chosen. The student's intent must be indicated on a form which is available in the Registrar's Office.

More complete information may be obtained in the Registrar's Office.

Pass-No Credit Option Regarding PE Activity Courses

Any student except PE majors and minors, may elect to take the required PE activity courses under the Pass-No Credit Option.

Grade Points

Grade points are counted on the basis of 4 points for each term hour of A, 3.7 for each term hour of A-, 3.3 for each term hour of B+, 3 for each term hour of B, 2.7 for each term hour of B-, 2.3 for each term hour of C+, 2 for each term hour of C, 1.7 for each term hour of C-, 1.3 for each term hour of D+, 1 for each term hour of D, .7 for each term hour of D-, and 0 for each term hour of F. Marks of I, W, NC, X and P are disregarded in the computation of points. The grade-point average (GPA) is the quotient of total points divided by total term hours in which grades of A, B, C, D, and F are received. For undergraduates, a minimum grade-point average of 2.00 (C) for all work taken at WOU is required for graduation.

Honor Roll

An undergraduate student is eligible for honor roll status for any term in which a minimum of 12 graded hours (ABCD) taken on campus are completed with a term grade-point average (GPA) of 3.50 or higher. A grade of F or NC precludes honor roll eligibility during the term in which it is received regardless of the term GPA. Credit hours earned through the Division of Extended Programs (DEP) or other state colleges via the concurrent registration process, as well as credit hours graded "P", are not acceptable toward the 12 hour minimum requirement. No honor roll is calculated for the Summer Session. (Honor roll does not apply to graduate students.)

Credit by Examination

This program permits an undergraduate student to take an examination in order to receive credit for any course listed in the college catalog, except those specifically excluded by a department. Further information can be obtained from the Registrar's Office.

Acceptance of Credits from a Two-year Institution

Credit transferred from an accredited community or junior college may be counted only to a maximum of 124 credit hours. Any

subsequent work taken at an accredited two-year institution may be used to satisfy course requirements, but credit for such work will not count toward graduation except by petition in special cases. A student who has completed 124 credit hours must obtain approval of his petition before completing any additional portion of his lower division work at a two-year institution, if credit for such additional work is to count toward graduation. For further information please contact the Registrar's Office.

Academic Advising

All students are expected to obtain assistance with their academic planning through the use of the advising program briefly outlined below. Students should be aware that they are responsible for developing and completing their degree programs (with advisor assistance) and that failure to follow designated procedures may create some difficulty in meeting graduation requirements. If established program plans are not followed by the student, the college will not be obligated to modify such plans unless the problems were beyond the control of the student.

An Advising Hold is placed on all undergraduate students, with the exception of those who have filed an official degree plan in the Registrar's Office, unless they have been placed on Academic Warning. It is the student's responsibility to meet with their major advisor prior to registration each term to have the Advising Hold released.

All students will be assigned to a specific advisor. Students wishing to change advisors should do so by contacting the department in which they plan to major and the Academic Advising & Learning Center, APSC 401.

Availability of Transcript

Upon presentation of appropriate identification, a student may obtain an uncertified copy of his or her transcript online at no charge. A certified copy may be obtained upon payment of the appropriate fee. Transcript services will be withheld until outstanding debts are paid.

OREGON UNIVERSITY SYSTEM SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER DISCLOSURE AND CONSENT STATEMENT

As an eligible educational institution, WOU must get your correct social security number to file certain returns with the IRS and to furnish a statement to you. The returns WOU must file contain information about qualified tuition and related expenses. Privacy Act Notice -Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code requires you to give your correct Social Security number to persons who must file information returns with the IRS to report certain information. The Internal Revenue Service uses the numbers for identification purposes and to help verify the accuracy of your tax return. For more information please refer to IRS code 6050S.

You are requested to provide voluntarily your Social Security Number to assist OUS (and organizations conducting studies for or on behalf of OUS) in developing, validating, or administering predictive tests and assessments; administering student aid programs; improving instruction; internal identification of students; collection of student debts; or comparing student educational experiences with subsequent workforce experiences. OUS will disclose your Social Security Number only in a manner that does not permit personal identification of you by individuals other than representatives of OUS (or the organization conducting the study for OUS) and only if the information is destroyed when no longer needed for the purposes for which the study was conducted. By providing your Social Security Number, you are consenting to the uses identified above. This request is made pursuant to ORS 351.070 and 351.085. Provision of your Social Security Number and consent to its use is not required and if you choose not to do so you will not be denied any right, benefit, or privilege provided by law. You may revoke your consent for the use of your Social Security Number at any time by writing to the Registrar.

ACCESS TO STUDENT RECORDS

WOU will endeavor to maintain only those records necessary to its educational purpose. With certain exceptions, a student has access to his or her own records for the purpose of review or, at the expense of the student, copying. Additionally, the student may challenge the content of any record pertaining to him or her and is entitled to a hearing, if desired, to assess the validity of the challenge.

Student records are available only to those who have a legitimate educational interest, such as faculty, administrative offices of the university, and offices allied to the university and which support the educational objectives of the university.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

Western Oregon University, a member of the Oregon University System, prohibits discrimination based on race, marital status, religion, sex, age, disability, sexual orientation, or national origin. This policy implements various federal and state laws, executive orders, Title IX and its regulations, and applies to employment, admission, education and facilities. 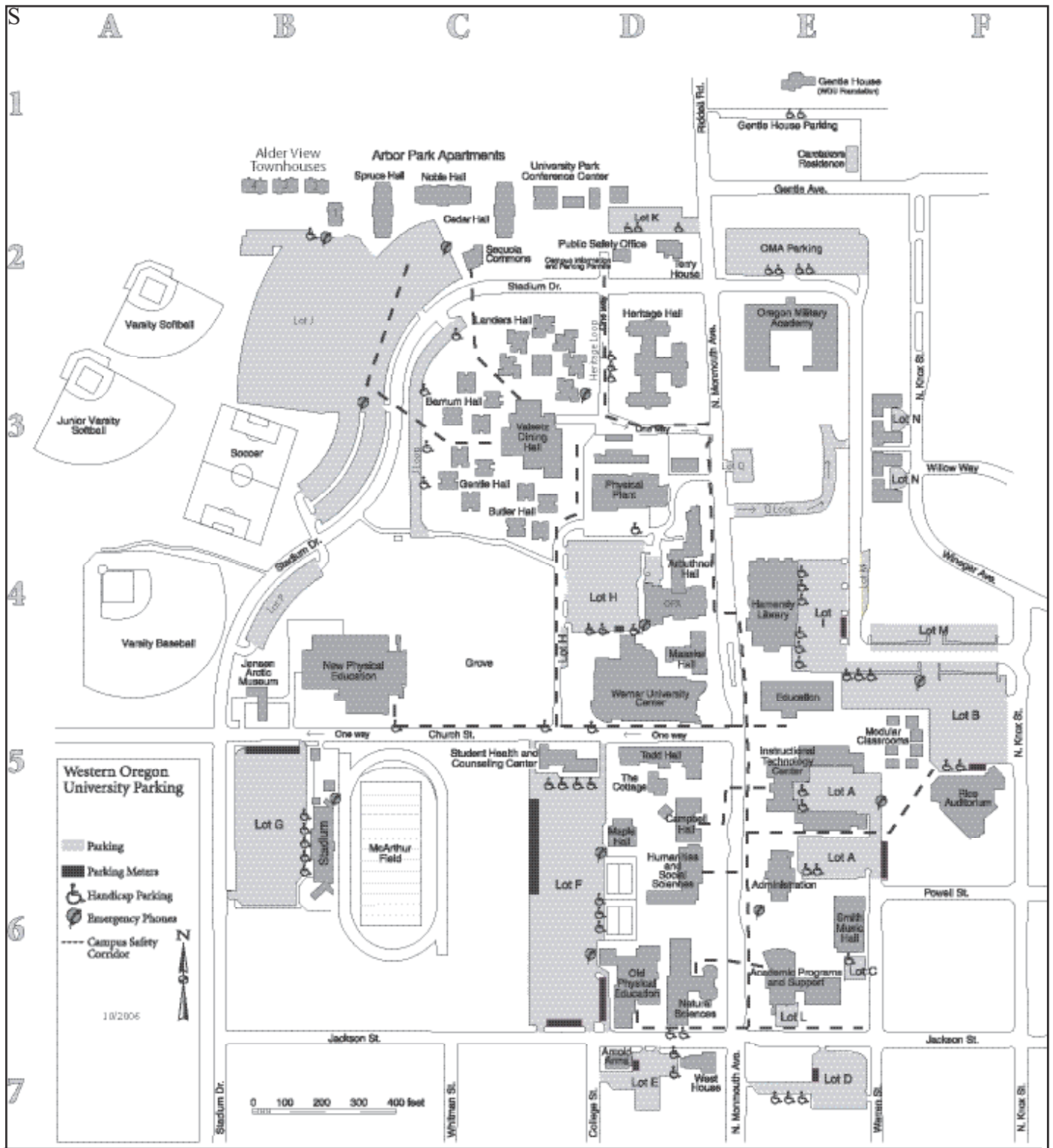
