### SPAN 103D: FIRST YEAR SPANISH III (4)

Span-103 is a course designed to develop students' communicative abilities in Spanish in these four (4) skills: speaking, writing, listening and reading, as well as to enhance the students' knowledge of 'Hispanic cultures.' This course provides students ample opportunities to practice their skills in Spanish given that the classes are student-centered, thus prioritizing a communicative approach towards learning. The grammar will focus on the contrast of Preterit/Imperfect Tenses, Commands, an overview of the Subjunctive Mood. *Prerequisite: SPAN 102 (or equivalent) or consent of instructor*

### SPAN 319D BILINGUAL & HERITAGE SPEAKERS (4)

### SPAN 320D, SPANISH BUSINESS (4)

This course is designed for students who want to gain specific knowledge for developing a business in Spanish while increasing cultural awareness and familiarity with the contemporary economies of Spain and Latin America. The course consists of discussion sessions in class and the creation throughout the term of a (mock) start-up including the development of a business plan, logo, commercial, and web page, among others. Neither prior experience in, nor knowledge of, business is required as this course provides introductory overviews regarding the several areas needed (e.g. Business jargon; Time Management, Marketing; Basic Web Design...). Given that all the components of this course regarding vocabulary and business concepts are integrated in a practical manner into a hands-on project, there will be no exams. ### SPAN 350, SPANISH PRONUNCIATION & PHONETICS (4)

In this course, we will study the sound system of Modern Spanish as well as its variation across Spanish varieties. We will cover the organs of speech and fundamental concepts such as phonetics, phonology, and sociophonetics. We will also identify which parts of the Spanish sound system are the most difficult for speakers of English in order to improve students' pronunciation of Spanish and to expand future teachers' awareness of typical difficulties in the acquisition of Spanish as a second language.
